- -Students will obtain an increased awareness of their social and civic responsibility.

Meeting 1

- -Brief Bio Including the following: Name, Major (Minor), Interests, Previous experiences with service based organizations & Where you grew up (City and State)
- -Why did you choose to participate in this experience for your Service Learning Requirement?
 - -What do you know about what happened in the Hurricane Katrina Disaster?
 - -What do you think you will experience in New Orleans?
 - -What do you think you can learn from this experience?
 - -What are your expectations for this experience?

Meeting 2

-1-2 page responses to 3-5 articles written about what occurred previous, during and in the aftermath of the Hurricane Katrina Disaster.

Trip

Daily Questions:

- -What did you do today?
- -How did you help people today?
- -What surprised you today?
- -What did you learn today?

Questions to be spread out over trip:

- -How are the people you provided services to different than you? The same?
- -Compare and Contrast what you are seeing first-hand with what you were assigned to read about in regards to the Hurricane Katrina Disaster.
- -Do you feel race has played or is playing a role in the people who have or who are receiving help and those who have not or are not?
- -Do you feel social class differences have played (or are playing) a role in who has or has not received help?

Debrief

- -What aspects of culture in New Orleans are different than where you live?
- -What did you learn about yourself from participating in this service learning trin?
- -What did you learn about working with others from your time spent on this trip?
- -Write 3-5 pages that discuss what you have learned and observed from your experience in New Orleans in regards to race, politics, class, disaster relief, etc. Feel free to use information from the assigned readings and/or other sources.
